As you will read in this report the website and ACNY (A church near you) continues to be a great asset to the church. Thanks to **Adele Eccleston** and **Nigel Sharpe** who constantly monitor both sites and ensure all the information is current and up to date.

Our online presence has also been maintained thanks to **Jonathan Lock** and **Mark Jones** who have worked hard to move us to YouTube. The YouTube channel offers a more consistent live stream and means that services are easier to find and catch up.

Throughout 2023 we were able to journey with people through their various life events. We had eight infant baptisms, three full immersion baptisms and two people were confirmed. We were delighted to be able to hold weddings again after the pandemic and celebrated with the marriage of three couples. Our work supporting the bereaved continued with 25 funerals.

Sadly, we lost several church members. There loss is felt across the church as many were long standing members. We thank God for those church members who entered glory – Alan Boardman, Eric Clayton, Tom Ellis, Doreen Faragher, Howard Huyton, Christine Henderson, Viv Jones, Muriel Nelson and Lynn Seddon. In addition, we held six internment of ashes services and nine more names were added to the memorial.

Sunday Services and Prayer

I am grateful to all those who help us



bring joy to our worship: Eunice Woof, Graeme Scroggie, David Smith, Mark Jones, Debs Raynor, John Raynor, Tookie Chessher, Jeff Shaw, along with Adele Spence, Bill Casey, Jenny Capstick, Emily Smith and Tess Raynor. The youth worship band continues to grow under the guidance of Neil Frackelton and Debbie Jones.

I also want to thank Pete Chalk, Bill Evans, Wally Coppelov, Jonathan Lock, Bill Casey, Eileen Hughes, Graham Rutter, Cian O'Donoghue, Wardens and Deputy Wardens for all their technical support in our services.

Our 9.00am service has continued to grow in 2023 with an average Sunday attendance of between 50-60 people. Numbers at 10.45 have been steady and we have seen some new families join us. Interactive prayer stations at both services have been welcomed and there have been opportunities for the congregation to participate in the services, including more people offering intercessions and Bible readings.

Our online praying community has remained steady throughout 2023 with many joining and viewing the services throughout the week. Four days a week there is a helpful discussion of Biblical texts and many people comment on Facebook. A big thank you to the morning prayer team for their consistent online presence.

We have also had consistent numbers at our monthly prayer meeting on the first Monday of the month and our monthly prayer walks. A record is kept at all the prayer meetings of what has been prayed for and it has been good to look back and see answers to prayer this year.

Worship

It is a privilege to be able to serve the congregation in leading worship, as we attempt to enable everyone to be 'lost in wonder, love and praise'. We continue to try to select a variety of styles of song, hopefully allowing everyone to feel able

to express themselves through praise and worship, whilst considering the different musicians and singers available each week.

The difficulty in logistics of finding a time when the whole band can practise means that we have perhaps sung less new songs than some might like, so this is something we are trying to address.

This year has seen the worship band getting used to the new AV system, and we are very grateful to Jonathan Lock who has generously invested a lot of time and money into setting things up. The final step in this process is for the band to transition using in-ear monitors, and having had a couple of practices with them we will soon be able to try them out in a Sunday service. Once this is all set up and running, the aim is that members of the band will be able to hear themselves and each other better, and so better serve the congregation. **John Raynor**

Night LYFE

Throughout 2023, Night Lyfe, the Sunday evening monthly service at Christ Church, starting at 7.30pm on the second Sunday of the month, aimed primarily at young people, has continued regularly with generally good attendance. Night Lyfe has involved a good contingent of young people connected to the church, and good attendance from across the wider church membership, to support the service, including regular attendance from Sarah and Jackie.

On occasion, we have also had some involvement from members of other churches in the Parish and wider area. Night Lyfe has, on the whole, followed a standard structure, incorporating a game, Worship time, a testimony from one of the young people, and a talk from various church, and external, people.

There are also usually opportunities

for the young people in particular to be prayed for at the end, if there are any particular concerning issues affecting them, or they just needed some general prayer or spiritual support. Other adults attending have on occasion also utilised this time for their own prayer and spiritual support.

The Night Lyfe Service has been generally led by **Fiona Craig**, until very recently, supported by a range of additional people helping with refreshments, and with the talks, and with support from the young people themselves.

Neil and Debbie have continued to support the development of the (Night Lyfe) Youth Band, which, other than Neil and Mick, (who is one of the young people's dads, who has recently joined the Band), involves young musicians from the church. Inevitably, due to young people moving on over time to University or other life changes, the Youth Band, since starting several years ago, has involved various charges in membership, but God has provided a constant flow of young people to support the Band in progressing and providing music and Worship support for Night Lyfe. We are extremely grateful to God for this. We are also very fortunate at present to have a stable group of 4-5 young musicians, (plus Neil and now Mick), to provide worship time at Night Lyfe, and supported by Debbie.

The Band practises once a week (Mondays) in term time, with gaps around Bank Holidays and School Holidays, and occasional illness related missed weeks, and we usually start with a brief spiritual reflection often provided

by Debbie, and a prayer from Mark. The young people involved enjoy practising in order to support a youthfocused service, and Debbie







and I have been encouraged by their talent, enthusiasm and commitment.

Mission, Outreach and Evangelism

A further four Hope Explored courses were held in 2023. Taking our total enquirers courses to 7 in two years. Each group is different, but all the courses have been a real encouragement as people have made commitments to Jesus and continued to come to church, some even joining a LYFE group.

In May we held a Coronation party and Eurovision party both of which were well attended and offered an opportunity for us to invite people from our local community along with our Ukrainian friends. Our joint 24/7 prayer weekend, open day in church and Pentecost service with St James Westhead and St Michael's Aughton was well received and acted as a springboard for more events together.

In June we invited all the godparents from our Baptism services to attend a special 'godparent' Sunday. Attendance was poor on this occasion, but it might be worth revisiting in the future. In July we commissioned our Café companions to offer a listening ear to customers who visit Café Vista and to support the Café Vista volunteers. In October the Pearl of Africa choir returned and as always were a big hit with our local schools and community. We also hosted a 'light night party for the local community as an alternative to Halloween.

In October we launched our very first Sanctuary Course to equip churches to support mental health. All those who have attended the course have spoken



highly of the material and of the professional delivery of the course by **Graeme Scroggie** and **Victoria** **Burton**. The running of this course is a huge asset to Christ Church, and we are extremely grateful to Graeme and Victoria for their hard work and commitment.

In November our young people hosted our annual Tear Fund Quiz. A big thank you to **Jane Lake** and our young people for their commitment to this annual event.

In 2023 **Louise Kelly** along with **Jane Lake**, **Annette Harrison**, **Lisa Matthews**, **John Raynor**, **Carmen Jones**, **Helen Fallows**, **Janet Roberts** and **Jackie Davies** setup our brand-new Youth 4 U club on Fridays after school.

This group is aimed at Year 5 and 6 pupils from Christ Church school, although other children have joined at various times. The group enjoy games, refreshments and a little reflective time

Our annual bereavement service in November – 'Embracing Hope', had a record number of people attending and one person joining our Hope Explored course in January.

In December **Jenny Capstick** led a Scratch Christmas choir and we were all treated to several carols and Christmas pieces in Advent. Everyone loved hearing the choir and we very much hope this will be repeated. A big thank you to Jenny for her hard work.

The St Helens Youth Brass Band attracted record numbers at the muchloved Carol Service and Professor Ian Tracey also attracted a crowd. During Advent we saw an increase in attendance for all our services with over 1,000 people attending.

A particular highlight was our very first live nativity on Christmas eve with attendance of 150 people many of whom were connected to our school.

Leadership and development

In September Sarah was able to take a 4-week sabbatical from Christ Church to focus on church growth and prayer. As part of her sabbatical, she spent time with the 24/7 prayer team in Waverley Abbey and with Emanuel Church in Lurgan, Northern Ireland. The sabbatical not only served as welcome refreshment but affirmed Christ's calling for her to lead, grow and serve the people of Christ Church and the community. The sabbatical also gave Jackie a great opportunity to lead the church and grow in her leadership role.

In November 2023 **Rev Jackie Davies** completed her curacy training and we were delighted when she secured her first incumbency post at St John's Ainsdale. Whilst we will be sad to say goodbye to Jackie, we are delighted to have been part of her curacy journey and are thrilled to be sending an extremely competent priest and pastor to the people of Ainsdale.

In 2023 **Rev Sarah O'Donoghue** spoke at her second National LYCIG conference (*Leading Your Church Into Growth*) and along with Rev Neil Short ran LYCIG local for the Diocese of Liverpool. In addition, they both ran two curacy training days on equipping curates in Evangelism.

Objectives

Christ Church Aughton PCC has the responsibility of co-operating with the Vicar in promoting the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical in this parish (PCC {Powers} Measure 1956). It is responsible for the maintenance of the Church, the Ministry Centre and the curate's house in Peet Avenue. Christ Church Aughton is a broad and welcoming church that seeks

to provide a spiritual home

for all who seek God in Jesus Christ.

We proclaim the Gospel of Christ according to the doctrines and practices of the Church of England, as part of the worldwide Anglican Communion of churches. We worship the one true God, enjoy and share the fellowship of all our members and friends and aim to share Jesus with everyone beginning in our community.

Appointment to the PCC

The method of appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. All church members are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and stand for election to the PCC. Members of the PCC are either ex-officio or elected by the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) in accordance with the Church Representation Rules.

Structure, Management and Governance

Christ Aughton PCC operates under the Parochial Church Council Powers Measure 1956. The PCC is registered with the Charity Commission – no. 1129036

The PCC (Parochial Church Council) has an important role in the governance and management of the church and its elected members are the representatives of the congregation. PCC meetings are normally chaired by the Vicar. The Wardens, Deputy Wardens and Deanery Synod Representatives are ex-officio members. PCC members are responsible for making decisions on matters of general concern and importance to the church, including deciding on how the funds of the PCC are to be spent. The



maintenance, repair, insurance of the church buildings and contents and the church grounds, are the responsibility of the PCC. Financial decisions are made jointly by the PCC and the Vicar. The full PCC normally meets every two months, with Standing Committee meetings on alternate months. The PCC receives regular reports from its Committee, Deanery Synod representatives, Ministry Team, Pastoral Care Team. Safeguarding is a standing item on the PCC agenda.

Committees

The PCC operates through four subcommittees, which meet as required between full meetings of PCC. Each subcommittee includes one or more coopted member who serves by invitation of the relevant sub-committee chair (who must be an elected member of the *PCC*), in consultation with the vicar. The principle of three-year memberships also applies to co-opted members. PCC members receive regular instruction and advice on their roles as Trustees, on health and safety issues. risk assessment and management, and on child and vulnerable adult protection procedures, from the relevant PCC officers.

Standing Committee

Required by law, it transacts the business of the PCC between its meetings, subject to any direction given by the full Council. Membership of the Standing Committee is the Vicar, the Churchwardens, Deputy Church Wardens, the Treasurer, and the Secretary.

Stewardship Committee

To assist the treasurer in all areas involving finance, including compliance with procedures, gift-aid, administration, financial planning, budgeting, charitable giving and special appeals. The steward-ship committee are also responsible for the personnel of paid employees and

The electoral roll

The roll at the time of writing indicates no significant overall change in total numbers. CCA has not suffered a dramatic loss of membership post Covid 19. It may well have gained a few

people who, for whatever reason, have chosen not to apply to go onto the roll. The worrying, although not particularly new, figures are those for the cohort age group 1920-1950 and 1980-2000. These suggest we have a high proportion of our congregation who are retirement age,

This is not a unique picture across the C of E or indeed other denominations.

those in their 20s, 30s, or 40s.

the majority of whom are in their 80's

and we are failing to attract or retain

The implications of this are already being seen in the difficulties experienced in finding volunteers for some types of tasks and is probably exacerbated by a gender imbalance due to the statistical fact that ladies tend to live longer than gentlemen!

Perhaps even more important, these figures highlight the crucial importance of expanding our ministry, particularly toward the post 1950s generations.

PCC Secretary's Report

This is my second report and I should like to start by saying a big thank you to **Jenny Ray** and **Liz Mawdsley**, my fellow 'scribes' for providing the reports from the Stewardship and Fabric sub committees respectively. The roles of these committees in doing the 'donkey work' behind the scenes and informing PCC decisions should not be underestimated

The PCC continues to meet alternate months, excluding August and December, with most members sitting on the Stewardship or Fabric sub-committees which meet in the months PCC is not meeting. The work of the Pastoral Committee, headed by **Angela Mellor**, and the Ministry Team also feeds into the PCC in order that it can make its decisions based on a comprehensive view of what is going on in the life of the Church and what the priorities have to be.

Much of the year being reported upon has been spent looking toward the vote on 'Fit for Mission'. It is tempting to describe it as time wasted but this would not be totally accurate because it did force us to look at the future in a way that we probably would not have done otherwise. Suffice to say that we were given four options by the diocese but created our own. The result across the deanery was that 40% opted to join, the remainder opted out.

The threshold for implementation having been originally set at 70% was promptly lowered. Sadly, one of the results of having to spend so much time on FfM was that we were unable to devote as much time to other things as would have been possible otherwise. On the plus side the experience has strengthened our relationship with the other parishes in our 'Cluster'.

At most of our meetings and services

we pray our Prayer for Growth and one of our outstanding aims is to appoint a Youth Worker and/or Families Worker. We have taken further advice on how and where to advertise, the initial attempts having failed to produce any candidates. We are apparently not the only parish with this problem, and we continue to look at how the very real needs we face can be addressed.

There has been much behind the scenes work being done about the area previously identified as a Community Garden but subsequently fenced off by the Scouts. Further plans have been drawn up and discussions with the diocese continue.

Other issues that have been addressed by the PCC include:

The operational staffing of the Ministry Centre. The administrative structure is working well but the caretaking and opening arrangements have proven difficult to overcome. Put simply, we need to be able to let the building more often to bring in the income that keeps it running but we cannot do that unless there is somebody available to be there before during and after events. It is proving difficult to find people to spend such time and will be expensive but we have decided in this instance we have to 'speculate to accumulate'.

Finance is an issue that has concentrated our minds a lot over the year. With the parish overspending at the rate of about £2,600 a month just on running costs. It is a problem that cannot be ignored. Although the maintenance work required because of the quinquennial review is well in hand under the guiding hand of **Josh Johnson**, there are always going to be

unexpected repairs and this year has been no exception. Work has been done to the stonework and roof and a







replacement door fitted at the top of the tower. In addition, we are committed to moving toward making the church and Ministry Centre more Eco Friendly with potential savings from solar panels and LED lighting. However, without the money available to invest in measures that will eventually generate savings we are having to look to grant applications for funding.

And finally, a big thank you to the various members of the congregation who have lent their specialist expertise to the PCC when we have needed it. We are greatly blessed by having amongst us talented people who have the professional knowledge we sometimes need. Sadly, we have lost one such person with the passing of the late Tom Ellis who provided much of our legal advice over many years and is greatly missed.

Treasurer's report

Firstly, I'd like to emphasise that I couldn't fulfil the duties of the treasurer role without the help and support of a number of people including Jane Archbold (Finance Officer), Jen Ray (gift aid and GASDS), John and Janice Appleton (giving envelopes), Stephen **Marsh** (Missions and Charities Officer) and Gail (general admin support), Edward McCarthy (Grant Specialist), Dennis Koogje, Chris Mathews and Paul and Bev Collins (Accountants) for which I am very grateful. As with everyone, the current financial crisis continues to have an impact on the church finances.

The monthly payments on the Ministry Centre loan have increased by



£463 during the year and are now costing £2,233.75 a month, whilst our combined energy bills for the Church

and Ministry Centre were £30,937 in 2023. This means our Reserve funds have reduced by £19,241.66 during 2023. If this continues without any intervention, we will go into debt by mid-2024. We have also had to carry out maintenance on the Ministry Centre alarm system and undertake preventative maintenance of the buildings fabric costing £15,648.

Noting the above, it is not all negative for 2023. Our Ministry Centre Hall lettings have almost doubled from 2022 levels to £11,875 but are still well below our pre-covid (2018) income of £18,966. We are hoping to employ a caretaker in the coming year which will help increase our Hall lettings and the associated income.

During the year, the finance team implemented cost savings including changing our telephone and broadband provider and our energy provider, saving £4,840/year. We have also recouped VAT overpayments on our energy bills amounting to £3,915. We are planning to replace the gas boiler in the church with infrared heating with estimated annual savings of £6,500/year. This should help reduce the outgoings to a manageable level in 2024. Due to ongoing issues with the donation station, we have replaced it with two Collect Tin devices which are linked to our Sumup accounts and have no overheads, thanks to Ionathan Lock.

Finance Officer report

2023 saw the usual mix of lots of different groups using the Ministry Centre, including our usual Bumps and Babes, Knit and Natter, Cave, FACT, GNI, Toddlers and Luncheon Club. We also have hosted lots of birthday parties and other celebratory gatherings. We have had regular income from renting out the





Ministry Centre to the Women's Institute, U3A, Spanish for Kids and Move it or Lose it classes to mention just a few. A value of over £17,400 in invoices raised in 2023

It is worth noting that over the year we have seen an increase in the number of people who are using the card payment machine to not only pay for service in Café Vista but are also paying weekly subscription fees and for generously donating to CCA.

In August we successfully implemented a change in how we pay our suppliers from cheques to BAC. Big thanks to Milly for her role in this. We also implemented a purchase requestion form. It is planned that by careful purchasing we can manage the Ministry Centre and Christ Church funds more efficiently.

Mission and Charities

For the year ending 31st December 2023, the Missions & Charities account received income from the monthly tithe (£12,144), and also received funds raised by the Knit & Natter group (£600) and 'Girlie Night In' (£227.30). The Knit and Natter group have specifically supported 'We Are Hope Street' and 'Age UK Lancashire'. Girlie Night In have supported 'Skelmersdale Food Bank'.

A total of £8,282.30 was paid out to support charities chosen largely by the LYFE groups. They include Mercy Ships, Safe Families, Leading Your Church into Growth, Prison Fellowship, Churches Together in Ormskirk, Pearl of Africa Choir, Mission Direct, Skelmersdale and Ormskirk Foodbanks, Reach Counselling, The Bible Society, 24/7 Prayer and YKids. We have six War Graves that we take care of by giving them an annual inspection, checking that the surrounding ground is kept clear of weeds and making sure the head stones are clean.

We continue to grow as a church and look forward to supporting those who seek and those who grow in faith. The many church groups, including the Hope



Explored programme of 3 evenings for the curious/interested to know more, have continued and flourished. We pray for each

Fabric Report

13

This report covers all the buildings owned or managed by the church. To include the Church, Ministry Centre, and the Curate's house at 25 Peet Avenue. The remit of the Fabric Committee is centred in two areas.

1) Maintaining the existing fabric of the Church and all church properties both external and internal including keeping the external grounds in a tidy and safe working order.

2) Improving the buildings, and their facilities to the benefit of the church and the wider community.

Church

The Ouinquennial Inspection was undertaken in April 2020 the contents of which were reviewed. Ninety eight percent of jobs which were required for the first 12 months period have now been carried out.

We need to complete the remaining 2 percent by the end of August 2024 which cost approximately £2,000. Regarding the jobs for the period 12 to 24 months, 97 percent of the jobs have been carried out with the remaining 3 per cent of jobs being completed by March 2025 with a cost of some £5.000.

The jobs that have been carried out over the last 12 months on the Church are as follows:

Boiler existing cooling fan repaired.

Boiler serviced, and Gas Safety Certificate

Roof repairs due to severe winds, replace damaged slates to fix a major leek near the southern church entrance.

Roof repairs as per quinquennial report to soil pipe and roof over toilets. Clean out guttering over all the Church and silicone leaking joints. Repair lead flashing to roof valley between vestry and the church.

Fit new Media screens to the new sound and vision system as part of the 2020 vision.

Replace the existing two-phase electric meters with one three-phase meter in preparation for the new infrared heating, part of the 2020 vision.

Gully cover lifted by the lamp post located at the main entrance to the church off the A59.

Supply and fix new oak door located at the top of the stone staircase, the entrance to the Church Tower roof.

Electricians supply and fix new wiring and sockets to new media centre.

Electricians supply and fix new wiring to connect the new three phase system to the existing control panels and fuse

Proposed works to be carried out over the course of the next 12 months providing funds are available.

Complete the remaining 2 percent and 3 percent of works for both 12 and 24 months that are required in the quinquennial report.

- 1) Complete new Infrared Heating and Lighting system in the Church as part of the 2020 vision
 - 2) New Glass doors to Church entrance as part of the 2020 vision
 - Construct new disabled toilets as part of the 2020 vision
- 4) Fill and repair tarmac footpath around the church to ensure safe and disabled access.
- 5) Repair lead flashing, clear internal and external vegetation were possible, to the top of the tower.
- 6) Repoint and repair stonework at the top of the Church tower and replace exit door timber frame
- 7) Carry out condition Survey of Church Tower
- 8) Repoint and repair stonework at various locations around the church as per quinquennial report.
- 9) Replace Cracked Hinge stones and replace hinges to external door into the Choir vestry.
- 10) Start the Memorial Garden possible.
- 11) Carry out roof repairs to ridge tiles and first row of slates on the Chancel roof.
- 12) Commence remaining

The grass cutting and grounds maintenance of both the church and ministry centre grounds are under contract to Max Sharp of Maximum Ground Maintenance who mows the grass and general maintenance and Paul Richards of Olive Branch Landscapes who cuts the hedges and trees. Both have continued to do an excellent job again this year.

A special thank you to the Community Pay Back Service workers who also carry out maintenance work to the grounds, tidying up the graveyard and removal of all dead flowers and painting to the Church and Ministry Centre. Also, the great work carried out on a regular basis by our own volunteers keeping the graveyard flower beds to both church and ministry centre gardens so neat and tidy.

A special 'thank you' to the female volunteers who carry out the cleaning to the church on a weekly basis organised by **Jenny Rawcliffe, Carole Rankin** and all the **Busy Bees.**

Ministry Centre

Jobs that have been carried out over the last 12 months are as follows:

Supply and replace leaking water softener filter cylinder to the commercial dishwasher located in the first floor Kitchen under the sink.

Remove, clean and seal backing boards, relay existing tiles to gent's toilet approximately area 8m²

Add dado rail to main hall to protect the paintwork from the stacking of chairs, paint rail and walls.

Service to lift and replace necessary parts.



Numerous call outs to resolve fire alarm and burglar alarm to resolve various issues.

Electrician carry out 5 yearly inspection of the electrical system to issue test certificate and rectify minor faults.

Electrician fit replacement LED lights to downstairs office and bottom of staircase

Plumber carry out Gas Safe inspection and issue Gas Safe certificate.

Air Conditioning unit in the café serviced and certificate issued.

Faulty central heating pump to the underfloor heating replaced in the plant room.

Fix and check out Automatic front doors on two occasions.

Re-paint external aluminium guttering, eaves boards, downspouts, and external doors to the Ministry Centre.

Carry out usual general maintenance.

Proposed works to be carried out over the next twelve months providing funds are available.

- 1) Painting to existing external aluminium windows to match guttering and downspouts.
- 2) Replace carpet upstairs in the two meeting rooms to laminate flooring.
- 3) Replace missing slates to roof.
- 4) Fault on disabled pad/button outside the main door to be rectified.
- 5) White lines to be repainted on the car park
- Window to be fixed in the main hall unable to open.

A big thank you to Gail and all the volunteer staff who keep the Ministry Centre office going. A special thank you to Lesley and all café vista gang for doing an excellent job every day and attracting new people to the Ministry Centre.

Also, a big thank you all church members who take part in giving the Church and the Ministry Centre a thorough spring clean every year and our day cleaners who do an outstanding job every week.

Our mission for the coming year will

be to further improve the services and the facilities that the Ministry Centre and café vista has to offer to our local community and beyond.

25 Peet Avenue

Jackie our curate moved in July 2021 and is sadly leaving us in May to be a minister in her own parish. Prior to that date an inspection/survey of the house will be carried out to ascertain what works are necessary for the house to be let or occupied by another Church worker in the future.

Over the last 12 months, the following maintenance work has been carried out:

- 1) Replace rear garden timber gate.
- 2) Carryout Gas Safe inspection and issue Gas Safe certificate.
 - 3) Check central heating boiler.

Garage requires a new roof and joists, plus underpinning to corner brickwork and foundation or demolish to create a parking area.

Replace and refurbish upstairs bathroom and toilet.

Replace and refurbish downstairs bathroom and shower.

Check for cavity insulation in the walls if none have the walls cavity injected with insulation to improve thermal heat loss and fit extractor fans to improve ventilation where needed to stop mould and damp developing.

Leaking Gutter to be fixed or replaced. Carry out survey to ascertain necessary works to be carried out.

Possible replacement of the existing combi boiler.

Vicarage

Nothing to report unless Sarah and Cian have carried out works.

In general, the fabric of the church and all associated properties and grounds

are in reasonable order and continue to be well maintained. The quinquennial report highlights the issues and prioritises the order of works to be carried out over the next year stressing the need for regular maintenance of the Church buildings.

Purpose of Group


Group approved by PCC February 2020, to make improvements in Church, to enrich both the life of the Church family and be welcoming to everyone in our community.

In November 2022 an Open Forum was held with the congregation, when members of the community were invited to discuss how to take forward the plans to improve accessibility and facilities for the disabled, including the provision of accessible toilets, resiting/refitting of kitchen, improving the access to church including new doors for the church porch and the re-ordering of the inside the church – to be known as phase 1.

At that meeting, concerns, were raised regarding the underfloor heating, and, so, the group spent some time exploring the options again. This has included visiting other churches to assess the effectiveness, visual acceptability, noise implications and discussions with independent heating engineers including exploring the option of infra-red heating.

Following a visit to several churches, including the Albion United Reformed Church, Ashton under Lyne, the 'halo' infrared heating was deemed to be both aesthetically pleasing and cost effective.

The Church of England is







committed to Eco Church sustainability. With this in mind, it was a requirement that all churches were to undertake a Carbon Footprint' return, which **Rikki Abernethy** completed on behalf of Christ Church. **Rikki**, **Joe**, and **Sarah** also completed a Heating Check list.

Following PCC approval, a faculty was submitted to the DAC, which incorporated a Statement of Need, a Statement of Significance, and a Feasibility Study. Once DAC approval has been received, it is hoped the work will commence in the summer of 2024.

The future

Moving forward, Phase 1 is still on the agenda for this group, but, financially, the heating is both a priority and necessity.

Christ Church Aughton Website

Since its launch in September 2022, the Christ Church Aughton website

https://christchurchaughton.org.uk
has been an important communication
resource, attracting the attention of
visitors interested in learning more
about our church community. This has
been most evident through the growing
number of requests for baptisms and
weddings and through the significant
number of visits to the website.

Between January and December 2023, when specifically searching for Christ Church

Aughton on Google, 3,590 people clicked on our website link that appeared in the search results and were taken to the home page. This does not take into consideration those visitors to the website that accessed it directly and



it is estimated that a further 2,028 people did so in this way. 1 Interestingly, 65% of visitors to the website accessed it by mobile phone,

30% by computer and the remaining 5% by tablet. Recent statistics show that, apart from the Home Page, the most viewed pages were: What's On, Worship and Prayer, Ministry Centre, About Us, History, Life Events and Contact Us.

The Christ Church Aughton website is also an important gateway to our micro site on the CofE 'A Church Near You'

https://www.achurchnearyou.com/ church/15222/

where we post all of our services and events (and more!). That site has also seen a significant increase in the number of visits, with a growing average of more than 32,000 page views in 2023, compared to 25,000 in 2022.

The two websites continue to be monitored and maintained by Nigel Sharpe and Adele Eccleston. These two volunteers, who are part of our national and international church community, are committed to ensuring the websites are kept up to date with regular updates and therefore ensuring the content is fresh and topical.

Having a dedicated team looking after both websites negates the risk of the sites becoming stale and irrelevant and ensures that Christ Church continues to be seen as being alive in the present, not buried in the past. We are pleased that our websites are helping to encourage visitors to experience all that the church has to offer, at home, in church and in the community.

Deanery Synod Report

Christ Church Aughton is part of the Ormskirk Deanery. The Ormskirk Deanery Synod met two times in 2023.

In June 2023, at All Saints Parish Hall, Rainford $\,$

There were two main items on the agenda.

1. Members of the Deanery Mission and Pastoral Committee/Deanery Leadership team were elected. The following people were elected.

Treasurer Peter Dorling
Lay representative 1 Colin Throp
Clergy representatives Rev David

Banbury (Assistant Area Dean)

2. Fit for Mission information roadshow.

Rt. Rev Beverly Mason, Bishop of Warrington, opened the session with a talk entitled, Why Fit for Mission. Attendees were then able to circulate around various stalls with guest experts present.

In September 2023, at St. Pauls' Skelmersdale.

The meeting was mostly given over to two issues.

1. A detailed exploration of Fit for Mission. A resume of the project was given, followed by a detailed explanation of the voting process for PCCs. There were Four Statements of Position concerning to what extent churches were prepared to engage with the Fit for Mission project, and it was made clear that PCCs should communicate their decisions to the Area Dean by noon on 24th November 2023.

There was a 'question and answer' session during which PCC members were able to seek clarification of issues that were of particular interest to their own church.

2. An update was given of the financial position of the Diocese. There has been

a significant fall in church attendance post Covid, and this, along with the increased cost of utility and other costs has led to a structural deficit of £1 million in the **DBF** budget. conversation with the National Church has been initiated about a new financial settlement for the Diocese of Liverpool, taking into account the uniquely low levels of historic assets alongside the challenging demographics in parts of the diocese. The National Church have been asked to carry out an independent review of the diocese. It is hoped that a decision may be made by December.

Reports from Church Groups and activities

School links and partnerships

This year we have continued to work in partnership with our church school offering pastoral support to teachers and pupils in the school. As parents have returned to work or their babies have attained the ripe old age of 1 year some have left the group and others 'graduated' to Toddlers (8 over the year). We continue to stay in touch through our WhatsApp group in order to maintain the link with church and with each other.

Bumps and Babes continues to have the aim of sharing Jesus through love and support for the youngest members of our community, and their carers. The WhatsApp group still has 28 members who talk with each other and are offered advice from each other. As group facilitator I let members know of church events and continue to pray for each child and parent, particularly when they have been facing difficulties and illness. We invite parents to bring their children



for baptism or thanksgiving and the Hope Explored course. Some came to the Light Night in October and others to the Christmas eve live nativity.

Luncheon Club is as popular as ever with continuous inquiries to book a place. There has been a small price increase which was accepted with no complaints which was just lovely. Our volunteer team are fantastic and always ensure a wonderful atmosphere, beautiful presentation, great service and incredible food. Again, 5-star rating from environmental health.

Café Companions have been running for nearly 6 months now with great results. Our wonderful volunteers come in every afternoon for 2 hours to be a gentle presence for anyone in need. Feedback from the volunteers is of great opportunities to chat, befriend or support lots of various people visiting the café.

We had to replace the dessert fridge after it broke. The money was very generously donated by two members of our church family. We also received a large donation specifically for the café which means we have a safety buffer should anything need replacing in the future.

We had a very generous donation of outside picnic benches from Wetherspoons in Maghull. This will enable us to utilise the outside area for drinks and cakes to encourage extra footfall during the day for mums with young children or visitors with dogs as well as a great usable space for our youth and lyfe groups on warm summer evenings.

The lead cafe volunteers coordinate with the office for online food shopping, cakes, meat and crisps all of which are

locally sourced. Gail would like to say a massive thank you to all the café teams but especially the leaders for all their help, patience, love and support while she settled into her role as MC coordinator.

Bookings for the Ministry Centre have been consistently growing with private parties and events like WLCC, Diddykicks and WLPA as well as regular weekly classes such as u3a, WI and Kids Spanish to name a few. We also have some new groups/classes like, Adult Ballet and Tap and Sense Hub.

The Community Social Group is struggling at the minute with attendees, but we are now working with the council in the hope they can get financial help and promotion. We are hopeful this can be turned around as the services they offer, which are free, is incredible.

girlie Night In continues to draw many women from our local and church community. New volunteers have joined with great ideas and even greater passion. We are beyond blessed with all the volunteers old and new.

All our MC groups are thriving, *Cave*, *Fact*, *Bumps and Babies*, *Knit & Natter* (*Knit & Natter Coffee Mornings are a big success and raise hundreds of pounds in the fight against Dementia*) and *The Sanctuary Course* with every space filled. Feedback is always positive from these groups.

The Ministry Centre is used for ministry purposes for our church community all of which are well attended along with various ministry events put together to bless our local community or to raise funds for local charities (Macmillan is well supported by the visitors to Café Vista and raise hundreds of pounds for

Cancer). Christ Church school continue to hold all their performances throughout the year in our main hall.



The building itself has been well maintained over the past 12 months with various works undertaken to keep the building in good condition. Josh Johnson will give a rundown of all works completed and those that may still need attention. Derrick retired in the summer of 23 and we have worked together as a team in regards to opening, locking up, fire marshals on site and general maintenance but we are now hoping to have a part time caretaker in the next couple of months to take up this role.

Pastoral Support

Pastoral support, at the heart of our service to all at Christ Church, has continued to flourish and develop during the past year. There are now 37 team



members supporting many people, both within the church community and further afield in Aughton. Individual support is provided with regular phone calls and visits, according to need.

We also support several local nursing homes through regular services of Holy Communion and visits to individuals. Within the team, there are five smaller groups, each with a coordinator, and they report to me regularly and through that to the PCC meetings.

This year we have further developed the pastoral support in church itself and through the many groups that meet each day in the Ministry Centre. Through this we aim to support more people and to encourage them in turn, to seek support through the friends they meet and interact within these groups. In church we have a team of welcomers and sides persons and during the week there is support for all age groups through the

following activities: Bumps and Babes, Toddlers, youth activities, Luncheon Club, FACT, Knit and Natter,

Cave and Lyfe groups. It is a measure of their success that we have had several referrals to groups from local doctors, for people going through a difficult period in their lives.

Each of the groups has a leader and we are developing a more formal structure of management and feedback from the groups to myself and Sarah, to identify areas of need and assist further development.

Mental health and wellbeing are so important in life now and we have been most fortunate that Graeme and Victoria, both trained counsellors and church members, have been able to lead two 8 week 'Sanctuary' courses, aimed at equipping people to support others with their own mental health. This work is ongoing, and I will report further on this next year and, in the meantime, to the PCC.

A team of Café Companions began work in Café Vista in July 2023 and have worked very successfully alongside the café volunteers, supporting any who come to the café and who would welcome a conversation and a listening

At the beginning of December 2023, we held our annual Service of Hope. A record number of 93 people attended and nearly everyone stayed for refreshments afterwards, reflecting on an emotional and supportive service for anyone remembering the life of a loved one.

As I said at the beginning of this report, pastoral care is at the heart of our ministry here at Christ Church. So, I want to say a huge thank you to all the team and to those as well, who work tirelessly in a less formal way to support some of the more vulnerable in our church family and in the local community.

LYFE

(Living your faith everyday) groups

Lyfe (Live Your Faith Everyday) Groups are the opportunity at Christ Church to meet regularly with other like-minded people to discuss faith, life and everything in between.

It is an environment where we build trust and are able to be open and honest about issues, whilst learning from each other through the power of the Holy Spirit more about what it means to follow Jesus. All teaching is rooted in Scripture.

LYFE groups are an important support network for members offering prayer and practical support for anyone and everyone in their group.

It is hoped that every church member is given the opportunity to be connected to a LYFE Group, and all LYFE Groups have an open-door policy welcoming new people at all times. It is the model that Jesus himself lived by and it is how

we as a church can disciple each other through Jesus' teaching and example.

LYFE Groups meet on weekday evenings with one meeting during the daytime.

At the Lent Course in 2023 Lectio Divina was the course provided by Pete Greig and the 24/7 Prayer Movement in which we have all learnt how to hear God more easily through meditating on Scripture.

It was encouraging to see all the Lyfe Groups and many others join together for this course in the Ministry Centre and as a result some people went on to form new groups and others joined existing groups.

Through the course of the year groups can develop their own style and can use our Sermon series as a guideline for discipling each other. But the ultimate aim is just to provide a framework which enables people to meet together, to pray together, to support each other and to grow in faith.

We also encourage groups to find ways to engage with others outside of church to share their faith and invite others on our Enquirers Courses, to support the local community, and to partner with charities and causes that they feel share the hope and love of Jesus to those around us.

Through the year we run our Enquirers Course 'Hope Explored' for new people and those with questions and we encourage these people to form or join LYFE Groups.

Ormskirk and Skelmersdale and District Foodbanks

Christ Church and Christ Church School continue to support the foodbanks in West Lancashire by providing food, toiletries, financial donations and volunteers for Ormskirk and Skelmersdale and District foodbanks.

Over the last year almost 1,500kg of food and toiletries has been donated which is the equivalent of 3,570 meals. There has also been nearly £1,600 donated by the church for which we are most grateful.

The Foodbanks provide about 3-days' worth of food and advice to people who find themselves in circumstances whereby they are unable to afford basics such as food. Recently the foodbanks

have been providing financial support to those suffering with payment of fuel bills. Over the last year, Skelmersdale foodbank have provided food to about 7,300 people and Ormskirk to about 1,900 people.
